

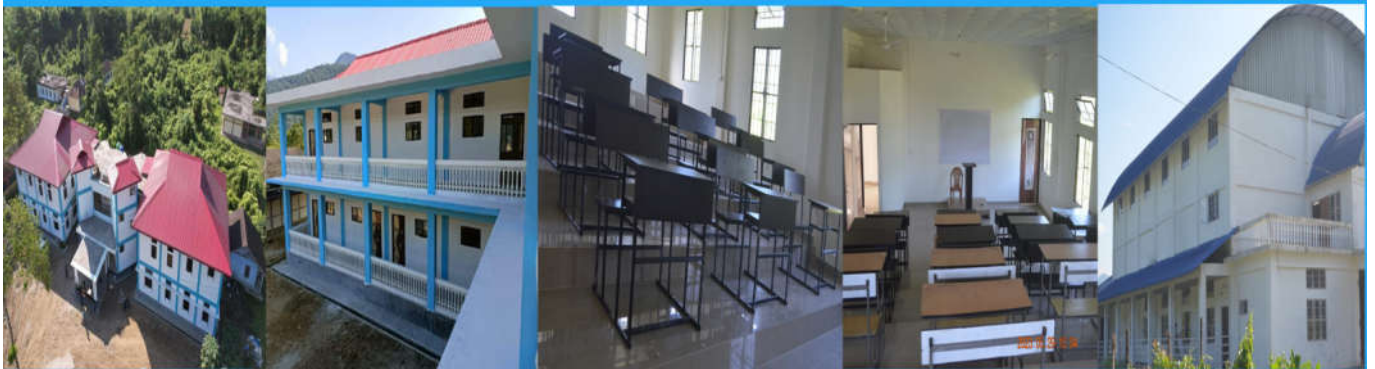

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1.0 COLLEGE PROFILE:

With a view to fulfill the aspirations of the people and the intellectual requirements of the student of *West Siang* District, ***Donyi-Polo Government College, Kamki*** was established in the year 1996. Situated amidst the lush green placid surroundings on the western bank of the river *Yomgo*, at a distance of 25 km from Aalo, the College is named after the Almighty *Donyi* and *Polo*, whom the inhabitants of the region regard as the symbol of Supreme Reality. About 1.5 km from the *Hiru* Bridge on the Trans Arunachal Highway *Aalo- Mechukha*, the College Campus is magnificently spread over an area of 103.7 acres of vast open land that really bestows a breathtaking panoramic view, ideally suited for academic and social life of the campus dwellers. In its nascent stage, Donyi- Polo Government College, Kamki started functioning with five dedicated faculty members and 190 students admitted to the Bachelor of Arts Programme modeled by Rajiv Gandhi University (then Arunachal University) to which it is affiliated. In spite of hindrances and constraints the Donyi-Polo Government College Kamki is steadily marching towards the desired goal of Human Resource Development and nation building. The results of the past consecutive years of University Examination revealed that Donyi-Polo Government College, Kamki is an institution to be reckoned with. The catchment area of the college for the purpose of admission is *West Siang* district and *Shi-Yomi* district. Student from outside the catchment area may be admitted subject to the availability of seats. Currently, the institution offers undergraduate programme on two disciplines viz. Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce. The institution will be offering Bachelor of Science programme in near future.

The college is recognized by the UGC (University Grants Commission) under section 2 (f), 12 (B). The college brings out spectacular performances both in curricular as well as extracurricular activities. The college has been re-accredited and awarded grade 'B' by NAAC (National Assessment and Accreditation Council, Bengaluru – an autonomous body under the UGC)

1.1 Institutional Vision:

The motto of the college is ***“SA VIDYA YA VIMUKTYE”***, which means **“Knowledge Brings Freedom”**. With this golden words incorporated in the college logo, this premier institution aims to nurture and develop the young learners of the society in terms of intellectuality and spirituality. It aims to inbuilt a healthy mind and soul among the learners through knowledge. The college aims to develop human resources required at different levels of the Society and to make them self-reliant in their life and society.

- To fulfil the aspirations of the people in general and the intellectual requirements of the students in particular.
- Being the only Government institution of higher learning in the region, the basic objective behind the establishment of this college is to facilitate the opportunities of higher education to economically backward students of Rural Tribal area.
- To train, guide and direct the abilities, energies and potentialities of the students in acquiring better knowledge and skills.
- Emphasis on women empowerment and their participation at all levels.
- Continuous and consistently marching towards the ultimate goal of nation building.
- To develop human resources required at different levels of the society. Besides these goals /objectives, the aim of the institution is enshrined in its motto ‘SA VIDYA YA VIMUKTYE’ meaning Knowledge brings freedom.

2.0 GENERAL INFORMATION

2.1 Library

The College has a well-equipped/furnished library having books on variety of subjects. The library is also equipped with good number of journals, magazines and newspaper. It provides one of the important academic services to the institute. The library has its own independent building with a seating capacity of 50(fifty) readers at a time. The library remains open from 9:00 am – 4:00 pm on Monday to Friday. The library has good collection of knowledge resources predominantly related to humanities and other social sciences along with resources related to research works.

2.2 Internet facility

Keeping in mind the increasing needs of the staff and student in the context of fast growing world of information technology, the College has full time Internet facility through permanent leased line from Airtel. Institution has its own domain “www.dpgc.ac.in”. This provides gateway to international academic world.

2.3 Bus / Transport facility

The College has a bus of its own. It is used for social service, group movement, marketing purposes of staff and students. For its maintenance and meeting of fuel requirement each student is charged with Rs. 300/- for the entire session. The staff of the college will also be charged at the rate higher than that of students. Apart from irregular, unforeseen and emergency trips, regular trips of the bus comprises of three trips for students and one trip for staff in a week. Apart from this, private transportation facility is also available from the college main gate area plying every 2 hours. **College Bus Service will be made available for day scholars residing in nearby area from this session (2023-24), the college bus will ply everyday (Twice – Morning & Afternoon, timing will be notified**

after publication of class routine). The earmarked bus stoppages are *Libu-Bene, Kamba bus stand and Diary Farm, kamki, bus stand.*

2.4 Career Counseling Cell

The Career Counseling Cell was started in the academic year 2002-03. Since its inception it has been rendering service to the student who seeks guidance of any kind that relates to their future endeavor. It prepares the students through proper guidance and counseling for academics, career prospects, entrepreneurship, soft skills and other vocational courses. Under the guidance of a coordinator career counseling cell, various Workshops / sessions are organised in collaboration with the concerned authorities and agencies for the larger benefit of the student.

2.5 Placement Cell

The Placement Cell plays a crucial role in locating job opportunities for under graduates passing out college students. Donyi Polo Government College, Kamki, in-collaboration with Tata Consultancy Services Ltd (TCS) provides “Employment Enhancement Training Programme (Affirmative Action Programme)” under National Career Service, Ministry of Labour & Employment, Government of India undertaken by Department of Labour Commissioner & Employment, Government of Arunachal Pradesh.

2.6 Institute of Distance Education (IDE)

In order to provide learning opportunities for those who want to learn while working and for those who are unable to attend as regular student for whatsoever reason, the institution has a Study Centre of Institute of Distance Education, Rajiv Gandhi University. It offers undergraduate and post graduate programmes in humanities and social sciences through non-formal education.

2.7 National Service Scheme (NSS)

To inculcate social consciousness and a sense of responsibility, discipline and dignity of labour among the youths, Donyi-Polo Government College, Kamki NSS Unit was established in the year 1998 with 50 volunteers initially. At present, the unit has 200 volunteers. NSS is under the direct control and supervision of the Department of Youth Affairs under the Ministry of Human Resource Development. The NSS unit is vibrant with activities and has rendered lots of social services as its regular activities and also conducted many special camping programmes. From the academic session 2021-22 NSS has been added as Skill Enhancement Course under Choice Based Credit System.

2.8 Women Cell

Women Empowerment is one of the most essential requisite for the progress of the society as well as for the nation. In order to create awareness on gender related issues, the Women Cell has been established. Regular

activities are carried by the women cell to guide, motivate and inspire the students in order to make them self-reliant and to be a positive contributing part of the society.

2.9. Media Cell

The media cell came into existence from the academic session 2022-23. It will be headed by a faculty appointed by the institution. It will act as nodal point for collecting and disseminating news about the events happening in the college to the media sources and public. It will also record and manages the events, to archive the media coverage of the college activities/events/notifications. It will be the single point of contact to receive public information from the college.

2.10 Educational Tour

Final semester students (APST) are eligible to be part of the Annual Educational Tour of the college. Since the seats are limited, the selection is done on the basis of academic performance of the students in the preceding semesters.

2.11 National Cadet Corps (NCC)

The Director General of NCC has accorded an approval for the raising of NCC Unit (Senior Division) at Donyi Polo Government College, Kamki under the affiliation of 22ndAP (I) Coy, NCC, Pasighat with a strength of 50 Cadets (Boys) in the year 2019. Since its inception, NCC Unit of the College started functioning. The NCC unit of the college is looking forward to instill amongst the students the value of patriotism, sense of responsibilities, selfless services to the nation and character building through various training and attending nationwide camps. From the academic session 2021-22 NCC has been added as Skill Enhancement Course under Choice Based Credit System. In the year 2020, 50 (Fifty) seats for girl cadets (Senior Division) has also been allotted to the college. Now, the college has both boys and girls wings of National cadets Corps (NCC).

2.12 Extra-Curricular & Co-Curricular Activities

i. College Annual Day Celebration

The College Annual Day Celebration is one of the finest platforms being provided by the institution to showcase talent and creativity and also to harness the overall personality development of students in the fields of sports, literary and cultural activities. It is being celebrated annually during the month of October-November. The overall management of the event is directly under the supervision of the office of the Principal along with the Students' Union Advisor and the College Management Committee.

ii. Games & Sports

The college has well-equipped infrastructure and a ground (both for indoor and outdoor events) with rostrum and sitting pavilions for spectators within the campus for all kind of games & sports event. A new auditorium is coming up and it will become functional very soon.

iii. Literary Activities

The College provides opportunities to the students in order to showcase their talents in literary activities by organizing Departmental seminars, Wall Magazine, Essay writing, Painting & Debate competition etc.

2.13 Attendance

Attendance in all the subject (classes) is compulsory. A student has to attend at least 75% of lectures delivered in each subject paper separately in order to be eligible to fill up the End Semester/University Examination Forms. Attendance in all officially approved co-curricular activities / association meetings is compulsory and is included in the class attendance.

2.14 Issue of Transfer Certificate

Students seeking transfer certificate shall apply to the Principal along with identity card and clearance certificate from the following:

- i. Hostel Superintendent (for boarders)
- ii. NSS Programme Officer
- iii. Librarian
- iv. Storekeeper
- v. HoDs of concerned department
- vi. Academic In-charge, (if necessary)
- vii. ANO/CTO, NCC DPGC Unit

3.0 Hostel Facilities

At present there are three boys' and three girls' hostels. All admitted students are eligible for Hostel facilities purely on the basis of merit. Preference will be given to Schedule Tribe (ST) & Student with Special Ability (*Divyangjan*).

N.B.:

✓ *The last Date for Hostel admission will be decided by the Hostel Committee.*

- ✓ *Vacancies in the hostel shall be allotted strictly on the basis of merit from the waiting list.*
- ✓ *Change of hostel seat, doubling and unauthorized occupation of a hostel seat is strictly prohibited and such cases shall be viewed very seriously by the college authority and the allotted candidate and person occupying seat illegally on his behalf will be debarred permanently from applying for hostel seat in future also and they will have to vacate the seat immediately.*
- ✓ *The selected students after payment of hostel fees to the cashier have to contact hostel Superintendent for hostel seats by producing money receipt.*

3.1 Hostel Fees *(To be paid at the time of Hostel Admission – see index 10.0i.e. the information on fee structure)*

3.2 Hostel Rules

Students in the Hostel are advised to make best use of the facilities provided to them for the betterment of their career achievements. Hostels are administered by a Hostel Management Committee and their decisions are final in matters related to the administration of Hostel. Boarders must strictly adhere to the rules governing the Hostel administration which are framed by the Hostel Management Committee and College administration from time to time; boarders are to strictly observe the following rules governing the Hostel:

- An undertaking has to be submitted by the student at the time of Hostel Admission that he/she will not participate in *Bandhs*, strikes or any unlawful activities, failing which he/she will be rusticated from the Hostel.
- A seat once allotted shall not be changed unless so allowed by the authority.
- A boarder has to obtain written permission from the Hostel Superintendent to leave the Hostel. Unauthorized absence from the Hostel and indiscipline in the Hostel will lead to the forfeiture of Hostel seat and even expulsion from the Hostel.
- Visitors are not allowed in any of the hostels without proper permission of concerned Hostel Superintendent, Prefect/Assistant Prefect or Hostel Superintendent.
- The boarders are required to keep their seats and surroundings neat and clean. Wall writing, use/preparation of alcohol and intoxicating drugs are strictly prohibited.
- Tempering of electricity connections in the rooms, use of heater and other electronics are strictly prohibited.
- Playing of Music System, Speakers or any sound devices during study and night hours is strictly prohibited.
- Every boarder shall join the Hostel Mess compulsorily. Hostel mess shall be run by a Mess Committee constituted by the boarders under the guidance and supervision of the Hostel Superintendent. The concerned Hostel Superintendent has the full authority to entrust or not to entrust any of the boarders for the management of the hostel mess.
- A Prefect shall be appointed by the Hostel Superintendent to aid him/her in running the Hostel Administration.
- Boarders leaving the Hostel will forfeit his/her hostel fee including the mess fee and such students will not be admitted in the Hostel in future.
- Camp fire and Partying in hostel is strictly prohibited. Hostel Prefect will be held responsible along with the hostellers breaching the rule and strict action will be taken against them.

4.0 STIPEND & BOOK GRANT:

All APST students are entitled to receive Stipend. Scrutiny, rejection (done by Institutional Nodal Officer of DPGC, Kamki) and disbursement of stipend is done by the Directorate of Higher & Technical Education, Government of Arunachal Pradesh. However, student must have an attendance of 50% per month, failing which Principal has the full authority to recommend the cancellation of stipend. All students have to submit their SBI A/C number to the college administration for availing stipend.

Eligibility for stipend:

Stipend Grant - Conditions: (A stipendiary must have an account in his/her name at SBI Branch)

The award of stipend depends on the satisfactory progress and good conduct of the stipendiary. If they are found guilty of misconduct such as resorting to or participating in strikes, irregularity in the attendance without the permission of the Principal and committing any major offence under the Rules- 8 of section 17 of Assam Education Department Rules and Orders (Vol.1) or breach of College and Hostel discipline, the Principal has the power to suspend the award of stipend with approval from the Governing Body of the College (College Managing Committee –CMC).

For the purpose of grant of stipend, monthly attendance shall be sent to the Directorate of Higher & Technical Education and the Directorate will grant the stipend on the basis of class attendance.

The Government shall have the right to cancel the stipend wholly/partly or stop/withhold further payment for such a period for reasons given in Rule- 8 of section 17 of the Assam Education Department Rules and Orders (Vol.1) or any other reason which the Government may think fit & proper.

If a student is found to have obtained stipend by false means, the stipend amount paid will be recovered by the Govt. Such Students will be black-listed and debarred from stipend of any scheme forever.

A Stipendiary shall cease to draw stipend as and when he gets a government job.

Stipend may be withdrawn if the student changes the course of study for which the stipend was originally awarded or changes the institution of study without the prior approval of the Government of Arunachal Pradesh.

Disbursement of stipend will be subject to regular attendance in the College/Hostel, satisfactory academic performance and good/decent behaviour inside and outside the College Campus. At least 50% class attendance every month is necessary so as to get the stipend for the month.

Stipend for a particular month will be deducted if a student does not have 50% attendance for that particular month.

Students are to submit their SBI A/C Number and Name to the respective College as Stipend Money will be credited to their bank account only

5.0 STUDENTS' UNION:

The Donyi-Polo Government College Students' Union is the General Body of students which is committed to the welfare of the students in particular and the college community in general. Every student becomes a member of the Union Body after getting regular admission to the College. Every student of the College enjoys the Right to get elected, Right to Vote and participate in all Union activities without interference with the day to day College administration and policy matters of the College/Principal. The Union must deliver its functions in unison with the Principal, Faculty and other Staff for the development of the College. The principal is the Ex-officio President of the Union and has the power to dissolve the Union for its objectionable activities. A faculty as Union Advisor is appointed as the in-charge, who guides and advice the Students' Union. The Union elects its Executive Body in the beginning of every academic session. The office bearers of the Executive Body are directly elected by secret ballot for the following portfolios:

1. General Secretary
2. Assistant General Secretary
3. Secretary Cultural Activities
4. Assistant Secretary Cultural Activities
5. Secretary Games & Sports
6. Assistant Secretary Games & Sports
7. Secretary literary Activities
8. Assistant Secretary Literary Activities
9. Secretary Social Service
10. Assistant Secretary Social Service
11. Editor College Magazine

Any regular student without any arrear and within the age limit and full filling the other requirements prescribed by Lyngdoh Committee is eligible to contest. The contestant must submit police verification at the time of filling up of nomination paper. The elections to various posts of Student's Union Body are conducted strictly as per the J.M Lyngdoh Committee recommendations and guidelines laid therein.

6.0 GENERAL RULES OF DISCIPLINE

- ✓ All bonafide students of the college must carry their college Identity Cards with them and will have to produce the same on demand by Faculty/Principal/College Authority.
- ✓ Every student is required to attend all lectures and practical classes.
- ✓ A minimum of **75% attendance** is required to be eligible to appear University Examinations and to be awarded stipend.
- ✓ Attendance in all sessional tests/examinations/common functions is compulsory.
- ✓ Students are expected to read the Notice Board every day. Ignorance of any notification will not be accepted as an excuse for not performing a required activity.
- ✓ Misconduct or Misbehaviour of any kind towards a faculty member or an employee of the college will be viewed

seriously and appropriate action will be taken against such student. Violence in any form is unacceptable in all educational institutions.

- ✓ Smoking, drinking and use of drugs in any form are strictly prohibited inside the college campus.
- ✓ The use of cell phones/mobile phones in the Lecture Halls, Examination Halls or during the common functions of the college is strictly prohibited.
- ✓ As per the Supreme Court of India, **RAGGING** within or outside the College Campus is strictly prohibited and punishable as per Law. Anyone found guilty of indulging in such activities will be rusticated from the institution along with complain made against him/her to the nearest Police Station.
- ✓ All the students must participate in all college programmes (co-curricular and extra-curricular) undertaken by the college.
- ✓ No Communal, divisive, separatist organisations or activity, formal or informal will be allowed inside the college campus.

6.1 COLLEGE UNIFORM (Dress Code):

The College authority has introduced College Uniform from the Academic Session 2016-17 and all students are expected to come to the College with proper uniforms prescribed for them. The main objective of introducing Uniform is to instill a sense of discipline among the students and to acknowledge themselves as an integral part of the College.

Uniforms or dress code prescribed for the Students of different classes are as follows:

- ✓ Black Trouser/Skirt and full sleeve cream shirt with Red necktie for I & II Semester.
- ✓ Black Trouser/Skirt and full sleeve cream shirt with Maroon necktie for III & IV Semester.
- ✓ Black Trouser/Skirt and full sleeve cream shirt with Black necktie for V & VI Semester.

As per the notification issued by the Government of Arunachal Pradesh, every faculty and staff must also wear traditional attire on 15th of every month.

7.0 AWARDS & RECOGNITION:

The Institution recognises the outstanding students of the college in university UG examinations through Principal's Meritorious Award every year. This initiative is undertaken by the collective efforts of IQAC DPGC, Kamki and office of the Principal DPGC, Kamki. This positive & constructive initiative was started in the year 2019 to facilitate the Academic temperament of the students. The Award consists of cash prizes and relaxation of college admission fees.

- ❖ The Principal's Meritorious Award for the overall college topper in university UG examination consists of cash Prize of Rs 10,000/-(Ten Thousand only) & a certificate.
- ❖ Departmental Toppers of the college in university UG examination consists of Rs 3,000/-(Three Thousand only) & a certificate.
- ❖ College Admission fee relaxation to college topper of II & IV Semester in University UG Examination.

8.0 ADMISSION: Information about admission & admission process (Session 2023-24)

For the academic session 2023-24, admission will be purely on MERIT BASIS. Only 600 seats are available in I semester out of which 500 seats are reserved for students of catchment area and 100 seats for non-catchment area. Applicant of catchment area securing 40% and above in AISSCE will be eligible to fill up the form for admission & applicants of non-catchment area having 45% and above can fill up the admission form. Students seeking admission in the college may obtain the Prospectus and Admission Forms (attached along with prospectus) from the college office on the payment of Rs. 250/- only.

There will be **no provisional** admission for compartmental students and their application will be considered only after the Declaration of Compartmental Examination Results. The applicant must secure at least 40% marks (for catchment area) and 45% marks (for non-catchment area).

N.B: The above academic calendar is subject to change as per the official directives/notifications as and when received from Rajiv Gandhi University (RGU), Rono Hills.

Those applicants who have not cleared English paper in 10+2 (class-XII) are not eligible to fill up the admission form. If such cases are found out, their application will be rejected.

Even if the results of qualifying/end semester examination are not declared on time, the admission process should be completed within the specified dates as mentioned above.

8.1 Eligibility for admission

B.A/B.Com 1st Semester: The minimum criteria for admission will be -

Clearing AISSCE (10+2) or any other equivalent Examination in five papers which should include English as Compulsory subject as such recognized by Rajiv Gandhi University.

Students who have passed with **40% marks** in AISSCE (10+2) in Science/Arts with mathematics/economics/statistics as one of the subjects or an equivalent examination recognized as such by Rajiv Gandhi University shall also be eligible for admission into the B.Com programme.

Open School Passed students are also eligible for admission but they must have secured the required qualifying Marks i.e. 45%

There will be **NO PROVISIONAL** Admissions for Compartmental (Class-XII) students. Their admissions will be considered only after the Declaration of Compartmental Examination Results (given they have secured the qualifying Marks and availability of seats). The interested candidates will have to take admission within 03 days from the date of declaration of compartmental result. The principal reserves the right to admit the students taking into consideration the course already covered and availability of the seats.

B.A/B.Com III Semester : Passed/Compartmental in B.A/B.Com II Semester from Rajiv Gandhi University.

B.A/B.Com V Semester : Passed/Compartment in B.A/B.Com IV Semester from Rajiv Gandhi University.

4. Transfer Certificate (Original) from the Head of the institution last attended.
5. Character Certificate (Original) from Head of the institution last attended.
6. Migration Certificate (Original) for students coming from outside Arunachal Pradesh/Open Schools.

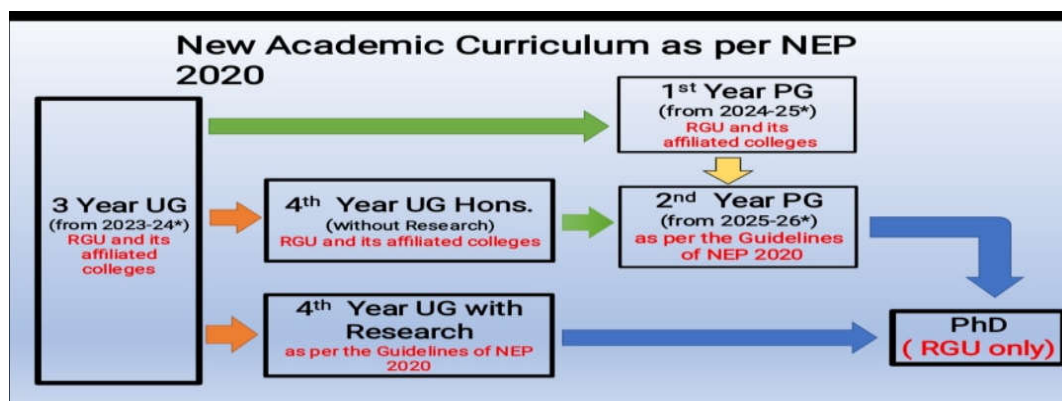

9.1 COURSE STRUCTURE (CBCS – Choice Based Credit System):

Duration of Course:

The degree program leading to the award of Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) shall be of three years duration and include six continuous semester under LOCF-CBCS (Learner Outcome based Curriculum Framework).

Course Structure: The minimum and the maximum credit requirement of credits for undergraduate course shall be 148 and 160 respectively and the CBCS shall include:

Core Courses- A course which shall compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is referred as Core Course (CC). There shall be 14 papers under Core Course of 6 credits each.

Elective Courses – A course which shall be chosen from a pool of courses and which shall be very specific/specialised or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course and shall include:

- A. **Discipline Specific Elective Courses:** Elective Courses offered under the main discipline/subject of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Elective Courses (DSE)
- B. There shall be at least 02 baskets of DSE as A,B, each containing a minimum of 04 papers of 6 credits each (which may also include Project work/Dissertation under group B).
- C. The student will choose 02 papers each in V & VI Semester from any group which may include a Project work/dissertation.

Generic Elective Courses (GE) – An elective course of interdisciplinary nature chosen from an allied discipline/subject with an intention to provide exposure beyond the discipline of choice is referred as Generic Elective Course (GEC). A core course of a particular discipline/subject may be offered as GE to the students of allied discipline/subject may be offered as GE to the students of allied discipline/subject and vice versa.

- A. College shall offer those GEC for which proper infrastructure and resources are available.
- B. Student shall choose 04 GEC, one in each semester from I Semester to IV Semester, either exclusively from one particular discipline or 02 courses each from two discipline but in both cases excluding his/her own discipline.

Ability Enhancement Courses– shall be of two types and both mandatory:

- A. **Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC)**-shall be the courses based upon the contents that led to knowledge enhancement and shall include courses on English, Hindi, MIL Communication, and Environmental Studies. Students have to select one AECC Course from English/Hindi, each of 4 credits, and Environmental Studies as a compulsory course.
- B. **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)** – the courses containing theoretical and/lab/hands-on/training/field work components and designed to impart value – based and/or skill based knowledge/life-skills to the students so as to increase their employability are referred as AEC. The student shall choose SEC from a pool of such prescribed courses, but only one course in a given semester, to fulfil a minimum requirement of 8 credits.

The student of Arts and Commerce discipline shall select 2 SEC, one each in III & IV Semester from either his/her own discipline or other allied/cognate discipline in order to fulfil the mandatory requirement of minimum 8 credits.

Important university rules:

1. Migration certificate is not required if a student has passed AISSCE (CBSE New Delhi) from the schools located in Arunachal Pradesh. Candidates from other parts of India/Boards/University are required to submit Migration Certificate at the time of admission.
2. Student in order to be eligible for filling up the University Examination form shall be required to attend not less than 75% of the full course of lecture delivered in each of the subject/papers in theory and practical (if any)separately.
3. **The students appearing in the Compartmental Examinations are to fill up separate forms for regular and compartmental Examinations separately.**
4. Candidates having appeared and failed three times in Honours/Pass course with Practical subjects are allowed to get re-admission in the first Semester. Students who are debarred from filling up the University Examination Form by College Authorities or who could not fill up the form have to take re-admission in the new session.
5. Students can apply for Improvement Examination after having completed the three year Degree course. After the declaration of Degree Final year examination results and within one year from the date of declaration of Results.
6. Students may apply for Re-scrutiny of his/her answer scripts within 30 days from the date of declaration of the Results of Degree Examinations in a prescribed form along with a fee of Rs.100/- for each paper (Max. 2 papers). Re-Scrutiny form is available in the Academic branch.
7. The three year Degree course must be completed within a maximum period of Six years.

BA/B.Com/B.Sc (Semester) Examination & Evaluation

- a. Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis.
- b. There shall be 20% marks for Internal Assessment and 80% marks for end semester examination in each course during every semester.
- c. There shall be no provision for re-evaluation of the answer scripts of the end semester examinations. However, a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.

Internal Assessment:

In Internal Assessment, different tools may be employed such as written Test, Assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work etc. suitable to the courses. The Procedure for Internal Assessment shall be as prescribed by the concerned Board. There shall be Three Internal Assessments for each Paper and average best of two shall be taken into account for University examination. **A student has to clear 02 (Two) sessional tests of each papers respectively to be qualified for taking End Semester Examination.**

The Students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall compulsorily attend and clear the Internal Assessment, failing which they will not be allowed to appear in the end semester examinations.

End Semester Examinations:

There shall be one End semester examination carrying 80% marks in each course of a semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the course. The end semester examination is normally a written/laboratory based examination/Project work/Dissertation as the case maybe.

The Controller of Examinations shall then take necessary arrangements for notifying the dates of the End semester examinations and other procedures as per Rajiv Gandhi University Rules and the Academic Calendar notified by the University.

The end semester examination for each course shall be of three hours duration.

Practical Examinations: Practical examinations of a semester in Practical oriented streams/subjects shall be held prior to the end semester examination.

Improvement Examination:

- ✓ A student shall be allowed to take the improvement examinations in any four theory courses of any of the six semesters after passing the sixth semester examination only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The candidate shall have to apply for improvement examination within one year of passing the Sixth Semester Examination.
- ✓ No improvement shall be allowed in the Practical examinations.
- ✓ Any difficulty which may arise in the course of operation of these guidelines/regulations relating to holding of examinations shall be removed by the Examination Committee of the Rajiv Gandhi University.

Results and Progression:

- ✓ A candidate shall be declared as Passed a course provided he/she secures—
- ✓ At least 35% marks in the course and 40% in aggregate in the End semester examinations.
- ✓ At least 40% marks in the Sessional/Internal examination (In-Semester) and End semester examinations separately.
- ✓ A candidate shall be declared as passed a semester, provided he/she passes all the courses of a semester independently both in Internal and End semester examinations.

- ✓ The marks of In-Semester examinations/Sessional tests obtained by the candidate shall be carried over for declaring a result.
- ✓ A Candidate who fails or does not appear in one or more courses of any End semester examination shall be provisionally promoted to the next higher semester with the failed course as carried over course(s). Such candidates will be eligible to appear in the carried over course in the next regular examinations of those courses. However, the following restrictions shall be applicable:
 - a). In order to move from a lower to higher semester, a candidate must pass in at least two theory courses and all the practical courses with an aggregate of 40% marks.
 - b). A candidate shall be entitled to a maximum of three consecutive chances to clear a back paper course.
 - c). A candidate shall be allowed to get maximum **two back papers** in each semester.
 - d). If a candidate clears the sixth semester examination before clearing all the backlog courses of the previous semesters, the final result of the candidate shall be kept withheld until he/she clears the backlog courses of the previous semesters.
 - f). A student must pass all his/her semester examinations within **six years** i.e. within 12 continuous semesters. In no circumstances this requirement shall be relaxed.
 - g). Since the semester system involves continuous assessment, there shall be no scope for a student appears as a Private candidate in any programme in this system.
 - h). A candidate shall be declared to have passed the six semesters Degree B.A/B.Sc/B.Com programme provided he/she has passed all the semesters and in all the courses separately securing an aggregate of at least 40%marks.
 - i). The degrees shall be conferred to candidates, who pass the six semester degree B.A/B.Sc/B.Com programme in the following manner.
